It is a way in which we stand apart from our competition. We give back to our members in many ways and monetary donations are only a part of what we provide. In the month of October, we gave back 1.4 million to our members in capital credits, which made an economic impact to the communities in which we live. FROM THE CEO

In 1964 the Beatles released the song "A Hard Day's Night". While John Lennon's lyrics may not all be about working hard and had various somewhat sketchy interpretations, I will take the first 4 lines at face value. "It's been a hard day's night. And I've been working like a

dog. It's been a hard day's night. I should be sleeping like a log." That has to be what the 60's seemed like for the employees and directors of VC- Co-op. Things did not come easy. The manager resigned; a temporary manager was appointed. A new manager was hired, and he lasted only 32 days. A temporary manager was appointed, and a new manager was hired. He passed away after only 7 years in the job. Jerome Espe was appointed manager and he became the first long-time manager of the cooperative. In 1960, a few years after the purchase of the LaFarge Telephone Co., the members voted to move the headquarters from Viroqua to LaFarge. Wisconsin State Law required an office to be located in a part of the serving area and the co-op did not serve Viroqua. Much to the disappointment and protest of the members, the president overruled the vote to advisory only and the headquarters stayed in Viroqua. After that, the cooperative purchased the Westby Telephone Co. for \$109,000.00 in 1961. Plans to move the headquarters to Westby were executed and completed in 1963. Hmmm? Today, if you look at the top of the Borgen's Café building in Westby, you will see Westby Telephone Company engraved in the stone at the top of the building. The Yuba Telephone Co. was then purchased for \$12,700.00 in 1967, after a highly competitive bidding and negotiation process against the Hillsboro Telephone Co. Following that transaction, Wood Farmers and the Fox Ridge Switchline companies joined the newly formed Yuba Exchange.

The 1960's were a time when major upgrades to cable plants and central office switching were being made. Party lines were upgraded from 8 to 4 customers sharing a telephone line. Direct dialing calls were becoming the norm, including calls between towns. Aerial lines were being buried. The cooperative was spending double and triple the amount on upgrades than they spent on purchasing the various companies. Some things never change. With all the spending the cooperative had its neck stretched out a little too far. Times were lean. Vernon made an application with USDA-REA to purchase Monroe County Telephone Co. for \$3,500,000.00. That territory stretched from Cashton to Cataract and also included Sparta, Norwalk and Wilton. It was turned down. Interestingly enough, just this summer, Monroe County and many residents are lobbying us to apply for broadband grants and build into that county with our services. That would have been a huge addition and I wonder what things would be like today if it had happened. An offer was also made to purchase Coon Valley Farmers Telephone Company, but that too was not accepted. I feel that the current cooperative is aggressive, but not like they were in the 60's.

Hopefully the last line in the chorus, "But when I get home to you. I'll find the things that you do. Will make me feel alright", sums up the 60's. After all the attempts, failures, and hard times, the cooperative persevered and turned out alright.

Here is a special recognition of our employee Veterans.



John Hickok - In Oct. 1973 John was assigned to the 527th Military Intelligence Unit in Kaiserslautern Germany as a "Wheel Vehicle Mechanic". He arrived just in time to experience "Oktoberfest"! Although far from home, he really enjoyed sightseeing and skiing while in Germany.

During his time in Germany, he received *the Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal, was promoted to SGT. (E-5)*, and met his wife Brigitte. They were married in February of 1977, and reassigned to Ft. Gordon, GA. for Field Radio Repair school. After graduating 2nd in his class, he was reassigned to the 10th Special Forces Group at Ft. Devens, MA. During his time at Ft. Devens, he took part in two training missions to Lakenheath AFB, England...and two training missions to Volk Field in Wisconsin. He received a 2nd Good Conduct Medal, and the Army Commendation Medal. On Nov. 15, 1979 John received an honorable discharge from the Army.



Gunnar Gretebeck - In September of 1993, he began basic training for the U.S. Air Force. From 1994 - 1997, he was stationed in Colorado Springs at the North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD), which is located inside Cheyenne Mountain, where there is lack of daylight. He spent time in Germany at the Air Force Base (AFB)

Spangdahlen from 1997 - 1999, where he did crypto and network systems, along with aircraft mapping systems for planes (F16, F15, A10 Fighter). After he left the Air Force, he began contracting for the military from the years of 1999 - 2005.



Kevin Karowski - Went to Fort Jackson South Carolina in November of 1996 and graduated from basic training at the end of January in 1997. He got on a bus the next day to Fort Lee Virginia for Advanced Individual Training (AIT) for the next 3 months, specializing in setting up medium and large military tents. He moved back to Viroqua and was employed

by the National Guard one weekend a month, for the next 5 years. His unit also traveled to Germany for a 1 month trip to specialize in field exercise and training.

What is Multi-factor Authentication?

Multi-factor Authentication, or MFA, is an authentication method that utilizes multiple pieces of evidence to verify access to an account. The pieces of evidence used in MFA are: knowledge (something only you know, like a password), possession (something only you have, like a onetime passcode (OTP),



and inherence (something only you are, like a fingerprint).

MFA shouldn't be confused with 2-Factor Authentication (2FA), because MFA uses all 3 factors, whereas 2FA only uses 2. That said, using 2FA is inherently more secure than relying solely on a password to authorize access to an account.

Why do I need MFA?

To put it simply, passwords are very insecure. Most people are overwhelmed by the ever-evolving digital world and the need for strong, unique passwords, so they begin reusing or slightly modifying the same password for all their accounts. The possibility of multiple accounts being compromised is greatly increased if a password is reused and 2FA or MFA are not enabled. While it does require additional time to set up and use, the peace of mind that your accounts are secure is worth it!

How do I get MFA?

If your service supports it, you can usually enable it via the security options within your account. Enabling MFA will allow you to either use a third-party authenticator (TPA) app, or your phone number, to receive onetime passcodes (OTP) which are entered after your initial password. At this point, inherence authentication methods such as fingerprints are uncommon for online accounts. Typically, you will receive a long, randomized recovery code when enabling MFA. It is very important that you keep that code in a safe place; you will need it if you ever lose or damage your phone that is configured as your MFA device. It's also important to note that not all services have 2FA or MFA, so utilizing a password manager is a great way to keep track of strong, unique passwords for those scenarios.

Pumpkin Torte

Crust:

24 crushed graham crackers 1/3 C. sugar 1/2 C. butter

Cream Cheese layer:

2 beaten eggs 3/4 C sugar 8 oz. cream cheese

Pumpkin laver:

2 C pumpkin 3 egg yolks 1/2 C sugar 1/2 C. cream 1/2 tsp. salt 2 tsp. cinnamon

1 envelope plain gelatin

1/4 C cold water

Crust: Mix cracker crumbs, 1/3 C. sugar and butter in a 9 x 13 pan and press until firm.

Cream Cheese layer: Mix eggs, 3/4 C. sugar, cream cheese, and our over crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

Pumpkin: Cook pumpkin, egg yolks, 1/2 C. sugar, cream, salt and cinnamon until mixture thickens. Remove from heat. Mix gelatin in 1/4 C. cold water. Stir until dissolved. Fold into pumpkin mixture and cool. Beat 3 egg whites, 1/4 C. sugar and fold into pumpkin mixture. Pour over cooled crust. Top with whipped cream or cool whip.
